Henry C. L. Haskell, the antiquarian and literateur, is strongly of the opinion held by a recent local historical writer that the name "Wingsheek" as applied to the beach is not of Indian derivation, but rather of Scandinavian parentage. He also asserts that there is strong presumption that the Norsemen landed here, and that this is a part of the "Inland of the Sagas. In proof he calls attention to the fact of the profusion of wild grapes growing at this place, the abundance of which were especially noted in the rhymes of the Norse historians.

Antiquarians assert that the word "Wingsheek" is an undoubted corruption of the word "Wyngearts Hoeck," which in turn is from "Wyngearten," and is equivalent to what the Norsemen called the "Inland of the Sagas." "Wyngearts Hoeck" appears on many maps of the country published from 1630 to 1670. Mr Haskell has written a poem referring to these interesting historical facts, which will shortly be published.

He also asserts that there is strong presumption that the Norsemen landed here, and that this is a part of the "Inland of the Sagas. In proof he calls attention to the fact of the profusion of wild grapes growing at this place, the abundance of which were especially noted in the rhymes of the Norse historians.

Antiquarians assert that the word "Wingsheek" is an undoubted corruption of the word "Wyngearts Hoeck," which in turn is from "Wyngearten," and is equivalent to what the Norsemen called the "Inland of the Sagas." "Wyngearts Hoeck" appears on many maps of the country published from 1630 to 1670. Mr Haskell has written a poem referring to these interesting historical facts, which will shortly be published.
