

The request for the advance not only affects the mills controlled by the Manufacturers Association but also the plant of the Fall River Iron Works Company, of which Howard S. Borden of New York City is the president.

There are nearly 35,000 operatives interested in the outcome of the agitation. In the plant of the Iron Works Company alone there are upwards of 600 hands. The weekly payroll of the latter concern is figured in the neighborhood of \$40,000 and of the corporations of the city at nearly \$300,000.
