Roars of 450,000 Rock Old Southie
 Throngs in Deafening Tribute To Briscoe, Hynes and Curley

 The traditional gathering of the Irish clans—South Boston's St. Patrick's Day parade—erupted yesterday into an estimated 450,000 turnout that rocked Boston with the greatest shamrock festival in her history.
 Robert Briscoe, Lord Mayor of Dublin, was hailed in the manner of "a conquering hero" as he led the 10,000 marchers on their green-splashed route from Andrew sq. to West Broadway.
 Mayor Hynes, at Briscoe's side while hundreds shook hands, kissed, showered gifts and handed babies to the warm-hearted Dubliner, declared: "I've never seen anything like it!"
 Never before has old Southie been hit with such a double-barreled jolt as the sight of Mayor Briscoe, and James Michael Curley, who kept his vow, "I'll be there!" in the same parade.
 The waving, jaunty 82-year-old patriarch of Bay State politics, still recovering from his major operation, was also besieged in his slow-moving limousine.
 The most emotional moment of the day came when Curley's vehicle halted in front of the reviewing stand and he and the two mayors, Briscoe and

 Patrolman Philip Williams collapsed from smoke inhalation as he passed the children through the dense smoke to rescuers, and had to be carried over a ladder by firemen.
 Eight children and five adults escaped from the burning building over ladders and onto the roof to an adjoining building on Dover st.
 Three of the youngsters were taken to City Hospital where they were treated for burns and smoke inhalation. Officials described all three as in serious condition.

U.N. to Leave Towns In 2 Days, Says Cairo

Egypt Army Trucks Enter; U.N. Troops Go to Israel Line
 CAIRO, Mar. 18 (AP)—Cairo Radio said the Egyptian governor of Gaza announced tonight all U.N. Emergency Force troops will leave towns in the Gaza Strip within 48 hours.
 The radio quoted a statement from Maj Gen Mohammed Hassan Abdel Latif, the governor, saying the UNEF command agreed its troops would evacuate the headquarters building it occupied in Gaza and all the towns in the strip.
 The announcement indicated the present movement of the UNEF to the 1949 armistice line on the Israeli frontier would be completed Wednesday.
 Today UNEF moved increasing numbers of troops to 24-hour guard duty on the Israeli border, newsmen in Gaza reported.

Eisenhower to Ask \$400 Million Fund For Foreign Crises

 WASHINGTON, Mar. 18—President Eisenhower is preparing to ask Congress for a \$400 million emergency foreign aid fund, it was learned today.
 He intends to make the request in a special foreign aid message he will send Congress in mid-April. The message will set forth the administration's mutual security program for the year that begins next July 1.
 Administration officials said the Hungarians, Polish, and Middle East crises of the last six months convinced Mr. Eisenhower that he must have a large presidential fund to meet unexpected emergencies.

No Secret U.S. Promises To Israel, Dulles Reports

WASHINGTON, Mar. 18 (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles was reported to have told senators today the United States has made no secret promises to support Israel's position in the Middle East.
 Senators who came out of a closed meeting of the Foreign Relations Committee before which Dulles testified also said the Secretary gave them an optimistic report of conditions in the Middle East.
 Fresh from a conference with Mrs. Golda Meir, Israel's foreign minister, Dulles was said to have been pressed as to whether this country had promised Israel to back up her claim of free passage of ships through the Gulf of Aqaba.
 Dulles was quoted as replying there were no commitments beyond the expression of "hopes and expectations" that Israel's withdrawal of

Red Sox Offer \$Million for Herb Score

Indians' Greenberg Holds Huge Cash Bid in Abeyance

 SARASOTA, Mar. 18—The Red Sox today offered \$1 million to the Cleveland Indians for left-hander Herb Score. Gen. Mgr. Joe Cronin said tonight he made this offer to Gen. Mgr. Hank Greenberg of the Indians during a bleachers conversation at Payne Park in Sarasota this afternoon.
 Cronin and Greenberg huddled for several hours. Cronin admitted that the \$1 million offer remained in abeyance.
 Cronin said "It's true, it's true. Greenberg and I sat down and tried to make every possible combination for a deal. We couldn't do it, so I finally said to Greenberg, 'I am offering you \$1 million for Herb Score, and I said, take that to your board of directors.'"
 Cronin was asked if he were serious in this fantastic offer, and he replied, "Certainly." He added, "He didn't shake hands on it."
 "Is the offer still open?" Cronin was asked. He said "Yes. He said he would give me a ring." Cronin was asked if he were surprised that Greenberg made the offer public in Tampa.
